

Continuing Pharmacy Education Credit

Sandra Van Trease, group president for BJC HealthCare, provides strategic leadership and direction to the BJC Collaborative LLC, an association of Saint Luke's Health System (Kansas City, Mo.), Cox Health (Springfield, Mo.), BJC HealthCare (St. Louis, Mo.) and Memorial Health System (Springfield, III.). Van Trease earned her master's degree in business administration from Washington University in St. Louis, and her bachelor's degree in business administration from the University of Missouri-St. Louis. She is a certified public accountant and a certified management accountant. In 2004, she received an honorary doctoral degree from the University of Missouri-St. Louis for achieving distinction in her field and for contributing to the betterment of the University and the St. Louis community.

Van Trease is an active member of the St. Louis community and serves on a number of civic and corporate boards. Her leadership has been recognized by several organizations including the St. Louis Business Journal, Modern Healthcare and the YWCA of Metropolitan St. Louis. 
